God's Commitment to the Lost Sheep

This Psalm describes:

The extent to which God will go to replenish, to rescue, to restore and to revive his redeemed.

This Psalm illustrates in detail the parable of the lost sheep found in Luke 15:4-6

What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he has lost one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the open country, and go after the one that is lost, until he finds it? And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and his neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep that was lost.'

Luke 15:4-6

Verse 1 gives us the *intended <u>purpose</u>* of the Psalm:

Oh give thanks to the LORD, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever!

Verse 2-3 gives us the *intended <u>audience</u>* of the Psalm:

Let the redeemed of the LORD say so, whom he has redeemed from trouble and gathered in from the lands, from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south.

The Psalm therefore will: (1) <u>Remind</u> the redeemed why they should give thanks to the Lord (for his steadfast, enduring love)

The Psalm therefore will: (2) <u>Reveal</u> to the redeemed <u>how</u> God's never-ending love has reached them.

This Psalm is about:

The eternal securing love of God for those who are saved. (Among his already redeemed)

This Psalm is <u>not</u> about:

The extent of God's very great, saving love for the lost. (Those not yet redeemed)

This Psalm describes: Four types of children of God who are struggling in various situations.

This Psalm is meant to: **Encourage all types of** believers regardless of their struggle or situation that God's enduring love will find them.

Let's examine these four types of struggling children of God.

Keep in mind that in each situation the people being described are believers. Albeit stumbling, struggling and sinning; they are among the redeemed.

Group 1 The Wandering & Worldly (v3-9)



Some wandered in desert wastes, finding no way to a city to dwell in; hungry and thirsty, their soul fainted within them. Then they cried to the LORD in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress. (4-6)

The first group are those who have a deep spiritual longing in their heart but try to fill it through the world's system. They search & search with no real results... and during their search they find themselves in desolation, trouble & distress.

Their search for significance and satisfaction came in the form of seeking earthly cities and trying to find lasting pleasure apart from God... and what it resulted in was desert wastelands & unfulfilled longings.

The first group 'cried to the LORD in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress.' (v6)



God responded: He led them by a straight way till they reached a city to dwell in... he satisfies the longing soul, and the hungry soul he fills with good things. (7-9)

God <u>replenished</u> the wandering & worldly: (to fill up again)

He satisfies the longing soul. He fills the hungry soul with good things.

Group 2 The Disobedient & Detained (v10-16)



Some sat in darkness and in the shadow of death, prisoners in affliction and in irons, for they had rebelled against the words of God, and spurned the counsel of the Most High. So he bowed their hearts down with hard labor; they fell down, with none to help.(10-12)

The second group are those who have disregarded & disobeyed the instruction of God and as a result they have found themselves in prison, hard labor and even near death.

Their search for significance and satisfaction came in the form of disobedience and trying to find lasting pleasure apart from God... and what it resulted in was imprisonment & punishment.

The second group 'cried to the LORD in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress.' (v13)



God responded: He brought them out of darkness and the shadow of death, and burst their bonds apart... he shatters the doors of bronze and cuts in two the bars of iron. (14-16)

God <u>rescued</u> the disobedient & detained: (to save from danger)

He brought them out of darkness/death. He burst their shackles open. He shattered the doors & bars.

Group 3 The Sinful & Sick (v17-22)



Some were fools through their sinful ways, and because of their iniquities suffered affliction; they loathed any kind of food, and they drew near to the gates of death. (17-18)

The third group are those who have deliberately sinned and gone against what is right. Because of their sinfulness great illness and affliction has come upon them.

Their search for significance and satisfaction came in the form of sinful lusts and trying to find lasting pleasure apart from God... and like the prodigal son, what it resulted in was illness, misfortune and the brink of death.

The third group 'cried to the LORD in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress.' (v19)



God responded: He sent out his word and healed them, and delivered them from their destruction... let them offer sacrifices of thanksgiving, and tell of his deeds in songs of joy! (20-22)

God <u>restored</u> the sinful & sick: (to return to a former position)

He healed them. He delivered them from destruction. He let them offer sacrifices & sing songs of praise once again.

Group 4 The Corporate & Cunning (v22-32)



Some went down to the sea in ships, doing business on the great waters; They mounted up to heaven; they went down to the depths; their courage melted away in their evil plight; they reeled and staggered like drunken men and were at their wits' end. (23, 26-27)

The fourth group are those who like Jonah have ignored the mission of God (to redeem the lost) and instead took on their own business and attempts to be great. In their evil (self-center) schemes they found their plans smashed.

Their search for significance and satisfaction came in the form of great business ventures and trying to find lasting pleasure apart from God...and what it resulted in was wicked schemes, calamity and the brink of total loss.

The fourth group 'cried to the LORD in their trouble, and he delivered them from their distress.' (v28)



God responded: He made the storm be still, and the waves of the sea were hushed. Then they were glad that the waters were quiet and he brought them to their desired haven. Let them extol him in the congregation of the people, and praise him in the assembly of the elders. (29-20)

God <u>revived</u> the corporate & cunning: (to regain life and strength)

He calmed the storms. He brought them to safety. He let them partake in ministry again.



 Even as redeemed children of God, we are all prone to wander. We must be very <u>aware</u> of this propensity.

Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, prone to leave the God I love

Struggling to obey, slipping into sin & wandering off the path does not make someone unredeemed or change God's commitment.

4. We must cry out to God to rescue us from sin & unbelief and restore us to fellowship. We must <u>ask</u> him to replenish our joy and revive our passion.

5. We must be confident that God will always go looking for his wandering redeemed and he is eternally **faithful** to them, even when they are unfaithful.
