Phase One

of Jesus' discipleship ministry
could be described as:

Come-See-Believe

PHASE

1

In Phase One

Jesus challenged his disciples to **come** to him, **see** the things that he did and to **believe** the things he said.

PHASE

This **Come-See-Believe** stage lasted approximately **15 months** and covers the time when Jesus first called new disciples to himself, performed several miracles and taught primarily on the need to repent and believe.

Phase One

**is highlighted in the
first 6 chapters of
the book of John.**

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness, to bear witness about the light, that all **might believe through him.**

John 1:6-7

He said to them, **"Come and you will see."**
So **they came and saw** where he was staying,
and they stayed with him that day... Jesus
answered him, "Because I said to you, 'I saw
you under the fig tree,' **do you believe?** You
will see greater things than these."

John 1:39, 50

This, the first of his signs, Jesus
did at Cana in Galilee, and
manifested his glory. And
his disciples believed in him.

John 2:11

Now when he was in Jerusalem at the Passover Feast, **many believed in his name when they saw** the signs that he was doing.

John 2:23

For God so loved the world, that he
gave his only Son, that **whoever**
believes in him should not perish
but have eternal life.

John 3:16

**Whoever believes in him is not
condemned,** but whoever does not
believe is condemned already,
because he has not believed in the
name of the only Son of God.

John 3:18

Truly, truly, I say to you, whoever
hears my word and believes him
who sent me has eternal life. He
does not come into judgment, but
has passed from death to life.

the **necessity** to **believe!**

The big question then is:
What were the core beliefs that Jesus required
of his disciples during Phase One.

Core Beliefs

Phase One

DISTINCTIVES

DISTINCTIVES

(1) Low commitment.

Jesus did not require or even really discuss commitment at this stage. It was enough that the disciples simply came & listened and were involved in the activity that was happening.

DISTINCTIVES

(2) Event oriented:

This stage was centered more around events than teaching. Some of the more significant events occurred during this stage: *Water into wine at the wedding, the woman at the well, feeding of 5,000, walking on water.*

DISTINCTIVES

(3) Attraction vs training:

This stage was centered more on Jesus attracting followers than on training disciples. He wasn't concerned about their ability to teach or lead, he was simply trying to get their attention.

DISTINCTIVES

(4) Casual vs intense:

This stage was more casual and didn't have the intensity of the latter stages (*take up your cross daily, let the dead bury their dead*). In fact, after each event the disciples returned home and did not constantly live with/follow Jesus.

DISTINCTIVES

(5) Belief vs behavior:

In this stage Jesus was more concerned about his disciples believing the true meaning of his coming and his deity vs. their behavior, character and attitudes.

Phase One

of our discipleship efforts must
mirror the ***life indicators*** of Jesus'
first stage with his disciples.

Life Indicators:



In Phase One:
**Potential disciples responded to Jesus invitation to
begin to know him. (John 1:39, 45)**



In Phase One:

Potential disciples spend a lot of social/unstructured
time with a disciplemaker.
(John 1:39, 2:2)



In Phase One:

Potential disciples are **exposed** to truth/information that they won't be able to fully **understand** until later.

(John 3:4, 4:27, 32-33)



In Phase One:

Potential disciples witness the disciplemaker's passion
to please and serve God. (John 2:17, 4:34)



In Phase One:
Potential disciples witness the supernatural
acts of God. (John 2:23, 3:2, 4:19, 53)



In Phase One:

Potential disciples are involved with/experience
ministry. (John 3:22, 4:2)



In Phase One:
Disciples share
their testimony with others.
(John 1:19, 1:45, 4:39)



In Phase One:

**Disciples witness their disciplemaker
sharing the gospel with others.**

(John 3:15-18, 4:41)



In Phase One:
Disciples are baptized.
(John 4:1)



What were the **core beliefs**
that Jesus required of his disciples
during **Phase One**?

Core Beliefs

There are **19 distinct things** that the disciples are said to have believed in **Phase One**. By grouping similar beliefs we can pair them down to **10 Core Beliefs**.

God made the *world* and everything in it
through Christ. (John 1:1-4, 6-7)

Jesus came from *heaven*, is full of glory
and is above all. (John 2:11, 3:31)

Jesus was sent to the world by
God to *testify* about the truth.
(John 3:31-34)

Whoever believes this testimony has *eternal* life and will not see punishment. Jesus words are eternal life. (John 3:36, 5:24, 6:68)

Jesus is the *Messiah*, whom the
Law & Prophets spoke of.
(John 1:45, 4:25-26, 6:69)

Through belief you must be *born* again. Those who
believe will become a *child* of God.
(John 1:12, 3:2-6)

Jesus is the Lamb of God who will be/was
raised up to take the sins of man.
(John 1:29, 3:14-16)

By believing we have eternal life, we will not
perish & never be *condemned*. (John 3:15-18)

Jesus is the 'Son of man' who will *return* to
earth one day. (John 5:25-29)

Jesus is the *judge* of all. He will raise & judge the
dead and assign their eternal destiny.

(John 5:22-29)

Let's Summarize



The early stages of discipleship should focus on building *relationships* around common *events*.



In the early stages of discipleship we should not **burden** people with unnecessary hurdles...we should invite them to **simply** come



When teaching others (beliefs) we should teach gradually. When expecting application from others (behavior) we should do so incrementally.



When seeking application from a disciple,
guide them in the **life indicators** that
Christ sought in Phase One.



The process of discipleship *begins*
with what we *believe*.



Disciples don't need to believe everything
there is to believe about Jesus all at once.
There are stages of understanding & belief.



When deciding which truths to teach in Phase One; focus on **emphasizing** the beliefs that Jesus **required** of his disciples during this stage.



The emphasis of our teaching should be what the Bible says concerning Christ. **Who** he is, **What** he did and **Why** he came.
