What we want to try and do over the next few weeks is focus on the **major commands** that a disciple is instructed to obey over & over.

That is, of the 1000s of things a disciple is to be & do, we want to focus on the main things that a disciple is commanded be & do over & over to in the New Testament.




5 Major DISCIPLINES FOR TRAINING IN GODLINESS

of a Disciple




The discipline of regularly communicating with God.



The discipline of consistently learning from the Word of God.



The discipline of increasingly growing in obedience to God.



The discipline of graciously interacting with other people.



The discipline of devoutly sharing the truth with other people.

Studying

Studying is purposefully investing your time and attention to *discovering* more about the truth in the Word of God.



Studying

Studying is reading, observing, contemplating, evaluating, meditating on & <u>learning</u> from the Bible.



Studying Studying may include using outside resources, technologies & aids to help understand the truth more.

Studying must include the *applying*, doing and actually obeying the truth.

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When we think of studying the Bible we often only think of the "reading" part of the study...

....and usually overlook the "preparing""praying""concentrating" "applying & obeying" part of the study.

Studying includes the work of reading, concentrating, **observing** & documenting.

Studying includes <u>understanding</u>, accepting, believing, trusting & desiring.

Studying includes <u>responding</u>, surrendering, applying & obeying.

"Merely reading the Bible is no use at all...we study it thoroughly, and hunt it through, as it were, for some great truth." D.L. Moody

"We fail in our duty to study God's Word not so much because it is difficult to understand, not so much because it is dull and boring, but because it is work. Our problem is not a lack of intelligence or a lack of passion. Our problem is that we are lazy." R.C. Sproul

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work. 2 Timothy 3:16-17

Study, to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth. 2 Timothy 2:15

This book of the law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all that is written in it; for then you will make your way prosperous, and then you will have success. Joshua 1:8

I will study your commandments and reflect on your ways. I will delight in your decrees and not forget your word. Psalm 119:15-16




Set a time.

Reserve a slot in the day when you can **set** aside a *consistent* block of time to just to study the Bible.

Set an alarm. Use your phone or watch to remind you of your *commitment* to study. We will do what is scheduled, we will neglect what is unscheduled.

Set a place. Find a quiet, removed & private location where you can go to <u>concentrate</u> on the Word of God.



Get quiet. ctions. Turn off and get away

Turn off all <u>distractions</u>. Turn off and get away from anything that could interrupt and hinder.

Get a version.

Find a version of the Bible that works for you. One that is easy to <u>understand</u> and helps you engage.

Get a notebook. **Document** your findings. Take notes every time you study your Bible and keep them organized.



Get a partner. Pair up with someone else. Ask someone to join you in your studying.



Get a process. <u>Develop</u> or <u>adopt</u> a process for studying the Bible. And stick to the program, no matter what.

Studying the Bible correctly involves a process. 2 R

That process helps you to reach the **desired goal** of all Bible Study...





That goal is to: Correctly understand God's <u>intended</u> meaning of the text.



When God spoke to the writers of the Bible; he had a **specific intended meaning.**



By learning and applying certain Bible study techniques;



You can reach God's intended meaning more accurately & effectively.

The process for studying the Bible that we are going to encourage is an 8 step process.

Pick & print out a book of the Bible. **Read through the book** at least 3 times.

Gather historical **background information** and record it in your notes.


Make note of any immediate observations, trends, themes or questions you have.

Summarize the entire **book** into 3-4 sentences.

Summarize each chapter into 2-3 sentences. Summarize each paragraph into 1-2 sentences.

Make a log of your summaries in your notebook.

Specially mark important people, places and themes.



Mark lists and

any connecting words that show contrast, comparison, cause and effect.

Mark words that you simply don't know the meaning of. Make a note of any questions that you will need to investigate.

Try to **determine the meaning of** words/concepts you didn't understand.



Begin to try to **answer the questions** that were generated through your observation phase.

Consult other resources/helps, such as a commentary if you absolutely have to.

Re-read each chapter & paragraph. Intentionally looking for specific concepts. Concentrate on the truth attempting to be communicated. Summarize the main concept being communicated beside each paragraph, or when a new one is introduced.

Re-write a final draft of each chapter & paragraph summary. Allow the questions you asked & truths you found to give you a newer & stronger meaning of the passage.

Ask yourself, "What truths can I put into practice? What changes should I make in my life"?

Ask yourself,

"How would I try to communicate these truths to someone 15 years old?" Write down your answers.
